Mr. Buyer presented the proposed award summarizing the main points contained in the related memo. Mr. Valella noted for the record that this is a critical source contract as any disruption in service would have an adverse impact on current and future participants and could negatively impact a county where fair housing concerns continue to be an issue.

Mr. Valella moved to adopt the resolution; Ms. Leicht seconded the motion, and the following resolution was adopted:

Section 1. The Members hereby authorize the Corporation to enter into a critical source contract with CVR for the provision of mobility counseling services in Westchester County for a one-year period in an amount not to exceed \$363,640.

Section 2. The Members hereby authorize the President of the Office of Housing Preservation or any Senior Officer as defined by HTFC's By-Laws or any HCR employee authorized by HTFC's Board to execute any documents which may be necessary and appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.
