NEW YORK STATE HOMES AND COMMUNITY RENEWAL - BOARD MEETING Nassau County Rent Guidelines Board Meeting Held Via Teleconference Tuesday, April 21, 2020 7:33 p.m.

MR. MICHAEL MILLER: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the first meeting for the Nassau County Rent Guidelines Board.

This format obviously is very different today based on all that's happening. We're going to have a statement read into the minutes in a few minutes.

However, I'm going to go ahead and introduce members of the Board. I want to start with, as it is on your -the minutes. We're going to start at the bottom with Barry, and we're going to work our way up.

So go ahead, please. Let's introduce our members of the Board.

MR. BARRY STEIN: Barry Stein here as a landlord representative.

MR. ROBERT RYCHLOWSKI: Robert Rychlowski as a tenant representative.

MR. ADAM MAHONEY: Adam Mahoney, public representative.

MR. MARTIN MELKONIAN: Martin Melkonian, public representative.

MR. GARRETT GRAY: Garrett Gray -- oh, for crying out loud.

MR. ANDREW COHEN: I'll go last.
MR. GRAY: Garrett Gray, public representative. MR. MILLER: Cathryn.

MS. CATHRYN HARRIS-MARCHESI: Cathryn HarrisMarchesi, tenant member.

MR. MILLER: Andy?
MR. COHEN: Andy Cohen, landlord's representative.
MR. MILLER: Is Jeannetta in yet? No.
All right. My name is Michael Miller. I'm a public member, and we're going to go ahead and also introduce our representatives or attorneys.

Go ahead, please. Are you there?
MS. CHERELL BEDDARD: My name is Cherell Beddard, senior attorney for the Office of Rent Administration.

MR. MILLER: Thank you.
MR. JAMES FERRARA: James Ferrara, associate attorney, Office of Rent Administration.

MR. MILLER: Thank you, James.
MS. APRIL GRAY-HUERTAS: April Gray-Huertas, associate attorney, Deputy Bureau Chief with the Office of Rent Administration.

MR. MILLER: Okay. And I'd also like to introduce our host, Cherell Beddard. She has something she'd like to read in, and then I'll take back over.

Go ahead, Cherell.
MS. BEDDARD: Thank you. Good evening. My name is Cherell Beddard. I am a senior attorney at the Office of Rent Administration for Homes and Community Renewal. every effort to keep New York as safe and to mitigate the spread of Covid-19, and pursuant to Executive Order 202-1 which allows for the suspension of the open public meeting law, thank you for agreeing to attend the Nassau County Rent Guidelines Board meeting, today, April 21st, 2020, via teleconference.

Please note this meeting will later be transcribed, and that the public will have the ability to view the transcript which will be posted on HCR's website for the Office of Rent Administration under the public hearing section.

As this is a new process to all of us, there are some ground rules that I'd like to establish. First, we had our roll calls in which we introduced all of our participants. So I thank you for that. I ask that you do not speak over each other, to make transcription of the meeting easier.

Second, I would -- oh, my God, hold on one second.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Is that part of the script?
MS. BEDDARD: I am so sorry. No, so I'm working
from the laptop at home, and it just went out.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We can hear you.

MS. BEDDARD: Great. All right. So second, I would ask that before every statement, I'd ask that you state
your first name because we are on the phone, and I would
need the names for transcription, and third, I would ask
that you mute your phone so that we can avoid any
background interference.
Now, I'll turn the meeting back over to the
chairman, Michael Miller. Thank you.
MR. MILLER: Thank you very much for that, Cherell.
Members, have you had a chance to review the minutes
of the last meeting?
IN UNISON: Yes.
MR. MILLER: I draw the motion to accept.
MR. STEIN: So moved, Barry Stein.
MR. GRAY: Garrett will second.
MR. MILLER: All in favor?
IN UNISON: Aye.
MR. MILLER: Do you note if there's any corrections?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No corrections.
MR. MILLER: All right. Guys, thank you very much,
and again, I'm glad to see everybody is safe. You know
we're in unprecedented times where so many of us have
been affected, either directly or indirectly, by this
virus. It's an invisible enemy that's really wreaking
havoc right across. Last week, I lost my own pastor
and --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm sorry to hear that.

MR. MILLER: Yeah. Thanks.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So sorry, Michael.

MR. MILLER: Thanks. It's --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Very sorry, Michael.

MR. MILLER: I appreciate it, but you know, we go on. And we've just got to use wisdom, practice social distancing, and do everything we're being told to do, and hence, the meeting in this format tonight.

As Cherell said earlier, please always state your name before we say anything. This way, the minutes can be properly recorded.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Right.

MR. MILLER: Now, I don't know -- and this is going more to James. Normally, we would kick off our meetings in May. We run up to June, and then somewhere around mid-June, then we'll start looking at presentation and then a vote, as you all know.

Now, is there any guidance that you have so far, James, as to timing?

MR. FERRARA: Yeah. So this is James Ferrara. We want to schedule the same four meetings: the two public hearings, the presentation hearing, and the vote hearing. We want to try to do them in June, and as per the deputy commissioner, we'd like to wrap up the week of June 22 nd with the vote, if possible.

MR. MILLER: Will that give us time, though, for presentation, though, because normally, after we meet, I think -- well, let's see how it goes timewise first because we're not really seeing -- we're not sure --

MR. RYCHLOWSKI: Can I -- this is Rob. Could I make a suggestion?

MR. MILLER: Yeah. Go ahead, Rob.
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: Could we first find out when we're -- about when we're going to get the income and expense reports, and then do the meetings sort of going backwards really, because the later on we have them, the more chance we have that we could meet publicly, and that the public could be there, okay? So I think we want to schedule them for as late as possible, even if they're all like one week after the other.

MR. FERRARA: I have a thought, Robert. We should have a back-up plan because, at this particular point, it could be, you know, extensive gathering with people, and so, we don't know, one, how the audience is going to respond with something like that. So we should have a back-up plan and possibly some Zoom kind of a situation where we could see each other as we're talking. It's just a thought, and that could be publicized in some way to the -- I guess to the public, but we should have a back-up plan because we don't know, you know, how the
social distancing is going to be -- you know, is going to be active at that point. I mean, I think it could be, to tell you the truth, which is -- rather, I can't be unpleasantly surprised if that happens, okay? My thought.

MR. RYCHLOWSKI: Yeah. No, I agree with you. Like I said, I want to schedule it for as late as possible in the year to increase our chance of being able to have it and for us to be together and for the public to possibly be there, but we have to obviously realize that may not happen. So a Zoom meeting would be definitely needed as a back-up plan.

MR. FERRARA: Okay. I agree.
MR. MILLER: And this is Mike back. Bear in mind, we're not doing anything in May, but we're actually starting in June. So we're looking right now about five to six weeks out. A lot can change in that time.

And Cherell, of course, obviously, we could look at, instead of just doing audio, doing a Zoom; this way we can have more audience presentation and, you know, see faces if that's something that we're allowed to do.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: One other point, Michael, if
I could. There may be some members, I mean, you know, we -- I have a camera. I'm in the house. I mean, if -you know, in my desktop. So you don't know if any of the
other members could -- I mean, do you need a camera to get into Zoom?

MR. GRAY: You don't usually. Only if you want your picture. It's Garrett. Only if you want your picture on the --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Well, I mean, yeah, I would assume if we're going to do Zoom, we would want our picture. I would think so. That's just my thought, you know.

MR. GRAY: But you can use your phone or your iPad which has a built-in camera.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Oh, that's true. You're right about that. That's true. Okay.

MR. GRAY: I'm usually right once a month, and that's it, so.

MR. MILLER: A key thing to bear in mind everyone is that, as long as we're seeing the names of the participants so it's clear who is speaking, we don't necessarily need to see everybody's face. It would be nice, but Zoom is very flexible. You can always mute your line, your audio, but you can also shut off your picture as well. So those are all things we can think about.

All right, guys. So let's run into -- let's look at your calendars all for June, and let's see -- first of
all, in June, is there any black-out time, any black-out
days that anyone has a challenge with?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Is anybody going on a cruise?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Not this year.
MR. GRAY: Mike, it's Garrett. I'm going to say
that I'm open every day. I'm actually doing two meetings
at once now, but any dates that are selected, I'm
available.
MR. MILLER: That's going to be --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I am too at this point.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Same here.
MS. HARRIS-MARCHESI: That's the same for Cathryn --
same for Cathryn.
MR. MILLER: Okay. Rob? Don't tell me Long
Beach --
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: Yes, I'm open. I'm open.
MR. MILLER: Are you going to have the beach open,
Robert?
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: We're going to have the beach open
by -- let me see. I'm estimating it that it's going to
be June 27th when it's supposed to open for the week
long. I think, the end of June, they're going to be
open.
MR. MILLER: You have no excuse, then.
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: No. Yes, I don't think I'll be

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tied up with volleyball this year.

MR. MILLER: Okay. Fine. That's good. Not a problem, then.

Okay, guys. So let's kick off what to -- remember, though, we're going to be cramming meetings, and we're also going to leave some room for presentation. So let's look at maybe the first week of June, then, to get started, and let's try to space this out because, after each week, we went to tweak test, see the response that we started getting, and also \(I\) want to throw in a rain date as usual should something, God forbid, happen we can work. So I'm thinking more of getting started maybe the 2nd or the 3rd.

Is everyone in favor?

MR. STEIN: That's fine. What day is that, in terms of --

MR. MILLER: The 2nd is a Tuesday. June 2nd is a Tuesday.

MR. STEIN: Okay.
MR. MILLER: All right.
MR. STEIN: That's fine for me. Barry Stein is okay with that.

MR. MELKONIAN: Marty is fine.
MR. MILLER: You know something very interesting as well. Mr. Ferrara?

MR. FERRARA: Yes.

MR. MILLER: Is that right that, if we go Zoom, then more people can actually participate in multiple meetings? We don't necessarily have to be in a location if we still sat down.

MR. FERRARA: Right. We haven't figured out how we're going to do the public yet. We're either going to do a call in like this --

MR. MILLER: Right.

MR. FERRARA: -- which by public notice will tell the public the number and the code, and we'll have to do it by phone. Secondly, we can do Zoom, possibly. We're going to look into it, and/or the third, the least desirable option is that \(I\) can email all of the public that I'm aware of; then let them email me their statements which \(I\) will read to you guys in the record. That's the least desirable --

MR. STEIN: That might be -- the reading of the statements, might be pretty good. In other words, if they go on, it might be difficult to control the individual public for time. I don't know about the clarity. I don't know of the control that Michael may have. This is just my thinking, you know, out to everyone here, but there is something interesting, even if it's Zoom, to have the person's name identified and to
have someone -- maybe yourself, James, not to put you on
the spot -- someone to read of -- or the tenants what
they feel or the landlords what they feel and put it into
a -- in writing, if that's possible. It's just a
thought.

MR. MILLER: All right.
MR. FERRARA: Yeah. Yeah.
MR. MILLER: So we'll keep that in mind. Then, based on what I'm saying, we can have three meetings, and it's around, but I think the participation level may be a lot higher.

All right. So we've got June 2nd. The following week, 9th or 10th, that's Tuesday or Wednesday. What are your thoughts?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's fine at this point, you know --

MR. MILLER: Good.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No objection.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: All right. Tuesdays are fine. Do you want to just go right down the line like that, unless someone has their block?

MR. MILLER: All right. Well, we put a Tuesday or Wednesday, we could do a rain check for the 16 th, and now we're going to jump down to the 23 rd for presentation. So let's do June 9th if everybody is good.

MR. STEIN: That's good for me. Barry Stein speaking.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.

MR. MILLER: Okay, Barry Stein.

The remainder of the guys, remember I'm not seeing you. All right. So we have June 2nd, June 9th, all Tuesdays, and then we're going to jump down to the \(23 r d\), possible presentation. Is everybody --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And what day is that of the week, so I know?

MR. MILLER: All right. That is --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Say that again. June 23rd --

MR. MILLER: Yes?

MR. COHEN: Tuesday.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: A Tuesday. Okay. Thank you, Andy. That's okay for me. One, two -- so that's three meetings so far.

MR. MILLER: Right. Normally, we would stick a rain check somewhere between the 16 th and 18 th, which would be between Monday and Thursday. I don't know if we need it this time. We could still put it in.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I think we should have it because I'm hoping that we'll be able to have meetings, because I don't know if like some of the seniors are
going to be able to do the email. I don't know if, you know, all the tenants have the computer capabilities to, you know, to be involved in this either. So I'd like to have tentatively scheduled locations and meetings and then just go to Zoom if it's undoable.

MR. MILLER: All right. So we're going to do that raincheck date for the 17th; that's Wednesday, June 17th, if everyone is in favor.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. Good.
MR. MILLER: Good. Got it. That's a Wednesday, and the presentation is going to be the 23rd.

Now, James, will that give you enough time for the data, everything we'll need?

MR. FERRARA: Yeah. That's about right. I've been in communication with our statistician people. They've already gotten over 48 responses from the owners. So they're collecting the data.

MR. MILLER: Okay.
MR. FERRARA: And I should be able to email you the presentation material the day before.

MR. MILLER: Okay. That's fine.
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: The I and E reports?
MR. FERRARA: Correct.
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: Okay.
MR. MILLER: Please state your name whenever you're
speaking.

MR. RYCHLOWSKI: So -- Rob, you're talking about you would be able to get the I and E reports into us before the 23rd?

MR. FERRARA: That's the plan.
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: Okay.
MR. MILLER: If that's the case, then, we could look at a vote as early as, not July 4th; we could go to the 14th, which is the week after. Does that still give you clearance around --

James, would be like July 14th?
MR. FERRARA: What? I'm sorry, Mike. It's June 14th for what?

MR. MILLER: On the vote.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: July 14th, we're talking about the vote. Okay.

MR. FERRARA: No. It has to be the end of June. I'm sorry. Go ahead.

MR. MILLER: That's what \(I\) was asking you earlier. It has to be end the June; we can't run into July.

MR. FERRARA: Yeah. This is James Ferrara. That's correct.

MR. MILLER: Well, I thought we got a waiver on that. That was my earlier question. All right. So in that case, then, we'd be going straight to the 30 th,
which June 30th is another Tuesday.
MR. RYCHLOWSKI: So you -- this is Rob --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I don't see any problem with that. I mean, June 30th, okay.

MR. MILLER: Are you good with that, James?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: June 30th for a vote, right?
MR. FERRARA: Yeah. I mean, I -- this is James Ferrara. I was thinking we could do the vote by the 25 th .

MR. MILLER: That's --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's the two days after.
Okay.
MR. MILLER: Well, the 24 th was an --
MR. COHEN: This is Andy. I can't do it on the 25th.

MR. FERRARA: Okay. Can we all do it on the 24 th?
MR. MILLER: Okay. So --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's the next day.
MR. MILLER: That's the next day, James. That's cutting it close.

MR. FERRARA: Okay, Mike. I mean, we've held them back-to-back before, but --

MR. MILLER: All right. Okay. Why don't we do this, then? Just to give ourselves a little bit of room, the 25 th resolved, could we look at doing maybe, instead
of the -- we have the 2 nd and \(9 t h, ~ c o u l d ~ w e ~ d o ~ a ~ m e e t i n g, ~\) the presentation possibly then on the 18th?

MR. FERRARA: This is James Ferrara --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So then you're saying June 2nd, 9th and June 18th, and then the \(23 r d\) would be vote? MR. MILLER: Yes. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm sorry. I've got a problem with Thursdays in June. That, I can't do. I won't be around.

MR. MILLER: Okay. What about --
MR. FERRARA: All right. This is James Ferrara. I
suggest we keep the \(23 r d\) as the present and look to the \(29 t h\) or 30 th.

MR. MILLER: The 29th is fine by me. MR. STEIN: Me too. Barry Stein. I'm okay. Andy, what about you? MR. COHEN: Yeah. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm good. MR. MILLER: Okay. So -MR. MAHONEY: Adam. The 29th is good. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's the vote, okay. MR. MILLER: Gray?

MS. GRAY-HUERTAS: Yup. That's fine. MR. COHEN: Okay. Andy's got a question here. MR. MILLER: Go ahead, Andy.


have -- a lot of them will have a phone but not have transport.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And also --
MS. HARRIS-MARCHESI: So that's just something I want to bring up.

MR. MILLER: Cathryn, you're right.
And think about this, guys. Do you remember how they used to get packed on a bus? Think about social distancing, getting them on a bus to come to a meeting. That might --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah. Not a good idea. MR. MILLER: All right. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Not a good idea. MR. MILLER: Okay. So -UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I have another thought, but go ahead. I just want to -- I'll wait until everyone is finished. In fact, let me just -- this is a little unusual, but what's going on in -- in particularly the real estate market, which, you know, I'm part of the owning and financing, and it's unprecedented times, what's going on with the banking situation, not only obviously with people losing their jobs, and that's across the board, but banks now are being just inundated with people -- tenants not being able to pay, for obvious reasons, their rent, and landlords now seeking relief
with the banks. Banks realizing that, also with
cooperation from a regulatory standpoint, that they're now structuring relief packages. I don't want to use the word forbearance. It's a more technical term. So I'm wondering if, like, the largest multi-family lender is New York Community Bank. Flushing Bank is okay, but that's probably the largest multi-family lender in the state, almost the country, not counting Fannie and Freddie Mac. What's your thinking of having a high official come and explain what they are going through from a lending banking standpoint which affects us all? What's the thought?

MR. MILLER: I don't know about --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Well, you can have the --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: If I can get the president, or I possibly could get the executive vice president of the bank, but that's up in the air. I don't know. He may not want to come. I don't blame him, but --

MR. MAHONEY: Well, this is Adam. This is Adam. I think that, you know, anybody who wants to testify in front of the Board would be fine with me. You know, that information would be very helpful for the Board, and also, you know, from the tenant's side as well, we would welcome any type of information that would help us, you know, to understand the specifics of exactly what's going
on in the market today.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: It's a -- I mean, I had something today with a large -- a very large deal in Middle Island, and it's age restricted, and he has now put a formal letter at the request send it to me that he wants the bank, you know, to lower the interest rate. I don't know if they're going to do that, but he's already explaining the issues that vacancies are coming and, you know, he's trying to work with the tenants and on and on, and it's real time. And now he's asking the bank for some relief.

They'll give him relief but not maybe the relief he wants, but right now banks are suspending payments and putting on the back end, doing interest only. It may change as long as the people are current, but that's -that's sort of aside from the lending what the landlords are going through. But there are, you know, a lot of decent landlords that are trying to work with the tenants. They may not have a choice, but they are trying to work with them. So there's the chain that -- I don't want to say six degrees of separation, but that linkage of tenants, landlords, and the lending because they still got to pay their bills.

MR. MILLER: All right. I'm fine with that, and I'm sure maybe others that, you know, want to participate,
especially around closer to presentation. So that's fine. I have no issues with that.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: All right. It may not -we'll see what happens. I may not be able to do that.

MR. MELKONIAN: Perhaps something in writing would be useful, though. This is Marty. Something in writing might be useful; if they send us a memo with their ideas, in the event that they can't come directly.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'll see what I could do. It's a thought, you know, because it affects us all in today's world.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I think we're getting a little ahead of ourselves here.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. Sorry about that.

MR. MILLER: So let's recap the dates.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.
MR. MILLER: We're looking at Tuesday, June 2nd; Tuesday, June 9th; the rain check date, we have Wednesday, the 17th; the presentation will be Tuesday, the 23rd; vote will be Monday, the 29th, all in June. And we're starting promptly at 7:30.

All in favor?
MR. STEIN: Okay. Aye. Barry Stein.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Before we get to a vote on that, I'd still like to interject that I would prefer to
have it in the location, to have it in Long Beach, have a meeting in Hempstead, et cetera. I don't know if we'll be able to do it, but I'd like to tentatively schedule them for locations, even if we have to then go to Zoom instead.

MR. MILLER: We're in favor of that.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I don't know. I want to think about that in terms of traveling in some of the locations. It's not necessarily a no under these particular times, but I'm not a hundred percent sure. Just for discussion, does anyone else have any thoughts about that? Normally, it's fine, you know.

MR. MILLER: Andy --
MR. COHEN: I would agree. I think it's premature to schedule a meeting for other people.

MR. MILLER: Let me speak. Right now, this is what we have to work with, guys. We'll get further guidance as we go along from the Governor's office, and obviously, the County, but so far, the ideal situation is always to have physical meetings, optional Zooms. The idea here is to get as much participation from the public as possible. I don't --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I thought Cathryn's idea of the Zoom. It really -- you know, who knows what -- let's say given the circumstances, but Zoom is to be -- and we
don't have to, you know, we could do some Zoom and some
possibly, you know, physical, but I guess that depends on
what the world is at that point.

MR. MILLER: Yes. And Zoom remember -- Zoom you don't have to -- we don't have to have cameras. It can be on a cell phone as well. It doesn't have to be -UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.

MR. MILLER: -- visual.

MR. COHEN: Could Andy weigh in for a second?
MR. MILLER: Sure, Andy.

MR. COHEN: Just a thought, Long Beach and Mineola are so large that it's very easy to social distance in those locations, as versus to Hempstead. It's much smaller, so --

MR. MILLER: If I think it's --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Long Beach is good. Mineola is good, but that's true. That's a good point.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I think it's very important, though, that we have one in Hempstead if we can so we don't disenfranchise the people who probably will not be able to make it to Long Beach or Mineola.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Well, that auditorium is pretty big also, if you could get that, other than the library. The library is very small, but if you could get that -- I forget what --


UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. I agree with that, but that's understood. I just wanted to have like, you know, people to be able to go to the location and do it because some of them are not going to be able to get on Zoom, and they're going to have difficulties with it, but I would, like, prefer the 23rd for Hempstead, and -- but I do understand, if we have to do Zoom, we'll do what we have to do.

MR. MILLER: Sure. Sure.
MR. STEIN: By the way, James, are you providing any spacesuits -- or never mind my humor, but okay. We'll move on. Don't mind me.

MR. MILLER: Barry --
MR. STEIN: Yes?

MR. MILLER: -- remember we have a guest on the line observing, so let's be nice.

MR. STEIN: Okay.
MR. MILLER: Any other question or comments, guys?

MR. STEIN: No, I think it's fine. Very nicely done, Michael.

MR. MILLER: All right. Thank you all. And do I have a motion for adjournment?

MR. STEIN: So adjourned, if no one else -- I don't know why this takes longer than the whole meeting. I move to adjourn.

EXECUTIVEQRDER
Continuing Temporary Suspension and Modification of Laws Relating to the Disaster Emergency

WHEREAS, on March 7, 2020, I issued Executive Order Number 202, declaring a State disaster emergency for the entire State of New York;

WHEREAS, both travel-related cases and community contact transmission of COVID-19 have been documented in New York State and are expected to be continue; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the State of New York, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the State of New York, do hereby continue Executive Order 202, dated March 7, 2020, and I hereby continue any suspension or modification of law made by Executive Order 202 for thirty days until April 11, 2020, except that such Executive Order is amended to read as follows:

FURTHER, pursuant to the authority vested in me by Section 29-a of Article 2-B of the Executive Law to temporarily suspend or modify any statute, local law, ordinance, order, rule, or regulation, or parts thereof, of any agency during a State disaster emergency, if compliance with such statute, local law, ordinance, order, rule, or regulation would prevent, hinder, or delay action necessary to cope with the disaster emergency or if necessary to assist or aid in coping with such disaster, I hereby temporarily suspend or modify, for the period from the date of this Executive Order through April 11, 2020 the following:

\section*{Suspension of laws and regulations to allow for expansion of services and temporary facilities for health and human service providers:}
- Subdivisions (a) and (e) of section 401.3 and section 710.1 of Title 10 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to allow hospitals to make temporary changes to physical plant, bed capacities, and services provided, upon approval of the Commissioner of Health, in response to a surge in patient census;
- Parts 709 and 710 of Title 10 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to allow construction applications for temporary hospital locations and extensions to be approved by the Commissioner of Health without considering the recommendation of the health systems agency or the Public Health and Health Planning Council, and to take such further measures as may be necessary to expedite departmental reviews for such approval;
- Sections 34-2.6 and 58-1.7 of Title 10 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to permit clinical laboratories to operate temporary collecting stations to collect specimen from individuals suspected of suffering from a COVID-19 infection;
- Section 41.34 of the Mental Hygiene law and Part 620 and section 686.3 of Title 14 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to allow facilities certified pursuant to Article 16 of the Mental Hygiene law to increase and/or exceed certified capacity limits without following site selection procedures and/or without providing notification to the appropriate local governmental unit upon approval of the commissioner of OPWDD;
- Section 33.17 of the Mental Hygiene Law and associated regulations to the extent necessary to permit providers to utilize staff members in the most effective means possible to transport individuals receiving services from the Office of Mental Fealth or a program or provider under the jurisdiction of the Office of Mental Health during the emergency, provided such facilities take all reasonable measures to protect the health and safety of such individuals;
- Sections 29.11 and 29.15 Mental Hygiene Law and section 517 of Title 14 of the NYCRR to the extent necessary to permit mental health facilities licensed pursuant to Article 31 of the Mental Hygiene Law that are treating patients during the emergency to rapidly discharge, including conditionally discharge, transfer, or receive such patients, as authorized by the Commissioner of the Office of Mental Health, provided such facilities take all reasonable measures to protect the health and safety of such patients and residents, including safe transfer and discharge practices;
- Section 29.13 of the Mental Hygiene Law and associated regulations to the extent individuals in areas affected by the emergency are temporarily receiving services from different providers, whose immediate priority is to stabilize the individual, address acute symptoms, and provide supports including medication and stress relief, such that it is impossible to comply with development, assessment, scope and frequency, and documentation requirements for treatment plans;
- Sections 131,132 and 349 -a of the Social Services Law to the extent necessary to allow screenings to be conducted by telephone;
- Sections 2510 and 2511 of the Public Health Law, to the extent necessary to waive or revise eligibility criteria, documentation requirements, or premium contributions; modify covered health care services or the scope and level of such services set forth in contracts; increase subsidy payments to approved organizations, including the maximum dollar amount set forth in contracts; or provide extensions for required reports due by approved organizations in accordance with contracts;
- Subdivision 4 of section 6909 of the Education Law, subdivision 6 of section 6527 of the Education Law, and section 64.7 of Title 8 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to permit physicians and certified nurse practitioners to issue a non-patient specific regimen to nurses or any such other persons authorized by law or by this executive order to collect throat or nasopharyngeal swab specimens from individuals suspected of suffering from a COVID-19 infection, for purposes of testing, or to perform such other tasks as may be necessary to provide care for individuals diagnosed or suspected of suffering from a COVID-19 infection;
- Section 400.9 and paragraph 7 of subdivision h of section 405.9 of Title 10 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to permit general hospitals and nursing homes licensed pursuant to Article 28 of the Public Health Law ("Article 28 facilities") that are treating patients during the disaster emergency to rapidly discharge, transfer, or receive such patients, as authorized by the Commissioner of Health, provided such facilities take all reasonable measures to protect the health and safety of such patients and residents, including safe transfer and discharge practices, and to comply with the Emergency Medical Treatment and Active Labor Act (42 U.S.C. section 1395dd) and any associated regulations;
- Subdivision 3 of section 2801-a of the Public Health Law and section 600.1 of Title 10 of the NYCRR, to the extent necessary to permit the Commissioner of Health to approve the establishment of temporary hospital locations and extensions without following the standard approval processes and to take such further measures as may be necessary to expedite departmental reviews for such approval;
- Section 2999-cc of the Public Health Law and any regulatory provisions promulgated thereunder by the Department of Health, the Office of Mental Health, the Office of Addiction Services and Supports, and the Office for People with Developmental Disabilities, to the extent necessary to allow additional telehealth provider categories and modalities, to permit other types of practitioners to deliver services within their scopes of practice and to authorize the use of certain technologies for the delivery of health care services to established patients, pursuant to such limitations as the commissioners of such agencies may determine appropriate;

\section*{Suspension of laws and regulations relating to child care to allow flexibility for providers while continuing to protect the health and safety of children:}
- Sections 414.7, 416.7, 417.7, 418-1.7, 418-2.7, 414.8, 416.8, 417.8, 418-1.8, and 418-2.8 of Title 18 of the NYCRR insofar as that regulation sets the ages of children who can be served and the standards for care; Sections \(414.13,416.13,417.13,418-1.13,418-2.13\) of Title 18 of the NYCRR suspending requirements for staff qualifications; Section 390 of the Social Services law suspending provisions setting capacity limits for family and group family day care programs and standards for staff/child ratios in all child care modalities; Sections 390(3) and 390-a of the Social Services Law and regulations at 18 NYCRR Sections \(413(\mathrm{~g}), 414.14,415.13,416.14,417.14,418-1.14,418-2.14\), allowing for the waiver of certain provisions establishing training and inspection requirements for
child day care; and Section 424-a of the Social Services Law insofar as allowing for the waiver of fees paid for statewide central register of child abuse and maltreatment database check;
- Section 410-w of the Social Services Law and sections 404.1, 404.7, 415.2, 415.3, 415.6 of Title 18 of the NYCRR insofar as that statute and those regulations establish financial eligibility standards, the reimbursement requirements, and set timeliness requirements for the provision of services including payment for absences due to COVID-19 abatement processes;

\section*{Suspension of regulations to prevent delays in providing home delivered meals and in providing services under the Expanded In-Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP) to older adults:}
- Clause (d) of subparagraph (ii) of paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) of section 6654.10 of Title 9 of the NYCRR, insofar as it requires an assessment be conducted prior to or within 10 days of the initiation of home delivered meals;
- Subdivision (h) of section 6654.16 of Title 9 of the NYCRR, insofar as it requires an assessment be conducted within 10 working days after the completion of the screening intake and prior to the initiation of services under the Expanded In-Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP);
- Subdivision (n) of section 6654.16 of Title 9 of the NYCRR, to allow for a care plan to remain in effect for a period exceeding 12 months under the Expanded In-Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP) when such care plan would otherwise expire during the period in which a disaster emergency is declared;
- Subdivision ( \(x\) ) of section 6654.16 of Title 9 of the NYCRR, modifying requirements for reassessments to be conducted every 12 months or within 5 days of becoming aware of a change in circumstance under the Expanded In-Home Services for the Elderly Program (EISEP);

\section*{Suspension of law to allow waiver of requirements necessary for apportionment of school aid:}
- Section 3604(7) of the Education Law, to the extent consistent and necessary to allow the commissioner to disregard such reduction in the apportionment of public money due to a failure by a school to meet the instructional requirements proscribed within this section due to the properly executed declaration of a local state of emergency as defined within sub-section (i), a school is directed to close by a state or local health official or following a properly executed declaration of a state of emergency as defined within sub-section (i), limited to the extent that those specified schools are unable to make up missed instructional days;

\section*{Suspension of laws and regulations relating to emergency procurement:}
- Sections 553(22), 559, 1209, and 1265-a of the Public Authorities Law, and 21 NYCRR Part 1002, to the extent necessary to purchase necessary equipment, materials, supplies, or services, without following the standard procurement processes, including the standard prompt payment policy;

\section*{Suspensions of law relating to appearances by defendants:}
- Notwithstanding any other provision of law and except as provided in section 182.30 of Article 182 of the Criminal Procedure Law, the court, in its discretion, may dispense with the personal appearance of the defendant, except an appearance at a hearing or trial, and conduct an electronic appearance in connection with a criminal action pending in any county in New York State, provided that the chief administrator of the courts has authorized the use of electronic appearance due to the outbreak of COVID-19, and the defendant, after consultation with counsel, consents on the record. Such consent shall be required at the commencement of each electronic appearance to such electronic appearance.

\section*{Suspension of law relating to waiting periods for unemployment insurance claimants whose claims arise directly out of COVDD-19 outbreak:}
- Subdivision 7 of Section 590 of the Labor Law, so far as it relates to the waiting period for unemployment insurance claimants whose claims for unemployment insurance arise directly out of closings of schools or other workplaces in which claimants were employed, or out of claimants' isolation or quarantine in connection with COVID-19; and

\section*{Suspension of law allowing the attendance of meetings telephonically or other similar service:}
- Article 7 of the Public Officers Law, to the extent necessary to permit any public body to meet and take such actions authorized by the law without permitting in public in-person access to meetings and authorizing such meetings to be held remotely by conference call or similar service, provided that the public has the ability to view or listen to such proceeding and that such meetings are recorded and later transcribed;

\section*{Suspension of law allowing residents of nursing homes to vote with modified visitor policies in place:}
- Subdivision 8 of section 8-407 of the Election Law to allow individuals not employed by the Board of Elections to assist residents of nursing homes or adult care facilities in the completion of absentee ballot applications and voting;

IN ADDITION, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 29-a of Article 2-B of the Executive Law to issue any directive during a disaster emergency necessary to cope with the disaster, I hereby issue the following directives for the period from the date of Executive Order through April 11, 2020:
- Any guidance issued by the New York State Department of Health related to prevention and infection control of COVID-19 at nursing homes and adult care facilities, including but not limited to guidance on visitation, shall be effective immediately and shall supersede any prior conflicting guidance issued by the New York State Department of Health and any guidance issued by any local board of health, any local department of health, or any other political subdivision of the State related to the same subject.
- Any large gathering or event for which attendance is anticipated to be in excess of five hundred people shall be cancelled or postponed for a minimum of thirty days.
- Any place of business or public accommodation, and any gathering or event for which attendance is anticipated to be fewer than five hundred people, shall operate at no greater than fifty percent occupancy, and no greater than fifty percent of seating capacity, for thirty days effective on Friday, March 13, 2020, except that any theater seating five hundred or more attendees for a live performance located in a city of one million or more shall not hold any further performances after 5 pm on March 12, 2020.
- The two preceding directives shall not apply to a school, hospital, nursing home, other medical office or facility as determined by the Commissioner of Health, mass transit or mass transit facility, governmental facility, law enforcement facility, or retail establishments including grocery stores. The Commissioner of Health may allow for businesses that are not public gathering spaces to exceed five hundred persons if the occupancy is less than fifty percent capacity subject to public health review.
